

## **Matthew Early Appointed Vice President of Campus Services at Emory University**

Atlanta, Ga. — Matthew Early has been appointed Emory University's Vice President of Campus Services, effective August 1, 2010.

Early will oversee the campus services organization's strategic, operational and financial planning, as well as the related policies and procedures that cover Emory's complex, multi-campus institution. He will manage an annual operating budget of approximately \$48 million and oversee and monitor the campus utility company, with estimated costs of \$371 million for 2010. In addition, an annual capital projects program generally calls for investments of more than \$50 million annually.

Early currently serves as Vice President for Facilities Operations at Columbia University in New York City, where he oversees units responsible for building maintenance and repair, grounds, engineering services and commissioning, sustainability, energy management, and environmental compliance.

Prior to working at Columbia University, Early was an officer in the U.S Navy, where he served in various positions, from Deputy Officer in Charge of Construction to Public Works Officer, at locations in Italy, Hawaii, and Florida. Early was responsible for the military construction program in Capodichino, Italy, executing \$450 million in new construction. As Public Works Officer in Jacksonville, Florida, he was responsible for maintenance, capital planning and improvements, construction management, and environmental compliance, overseeing 24,800 acres and more than 7.6 million square feet of buildings, with an annual budget of \$117 million.

Matthew is a professional civil engineer and a 1987 graduate of the U.S. Naval Academy in Annapolis, Maryland. He holds a Master of Science degree in Engineering, with minor in construction management from the University of California-Berkeley, and he has an MBA.
